DESCRIPTION:

This program shows the history of the city of Madrid from its Muslim origins, in the second half of the 9th century, the Middle Ages, to the present day. There are interrelated aspects: urban planning, political, social, artistic and cultural. This subject shows the historical development of Madrid and its double status as capital and city. The capital (1561) from where power is exercised over the rest of the country and its possessions, and the city and the daily life of its men and women. The history of Madrid is explained in its context, which is the history of Spain.

METHOD OF PRESENTATION:

- The teacher begins each topic with a presentation and the most important points of the topic.
- To develop the topic, the teacher supports his intervention in class with historical documents: written texts and images.
- He will encourage student participation through reading and commenting on historical sources: documents or images. The student is an active agent of his/her own learning.
- There are three mandatory excursions outside the classroom: Muslim Wall (Middle Ages), Hermitage of San Antonio de la Florida (Goya, 18th century) and the University City (20th century) where we can view the content learned in the subject. An optional excursion to the History Museum of Madrid.

REQUIRED WORK AND FORM OF ASSESSMENT:

- Midterm exam, written exam: 25%
- Final exam: written exam: 35%
- Summary (maximum two pages) on one of the compulsory excursions 10%
- Individual presentation in class: 15%
- Class participation: 15%.
