

EC/PO 322 ECONOMIC POLICY IN THE EU AND ITS IMPACT ON GLOBAL FOOD MARKETS IES Abroad Siena

DESCRIPTION: This course focuses on agricultural and environmental policies implemented by the EU and the effects of these policies on the economies of some European countries where agriculture is a dominant industry, particularly Mediterranean countries. In particular the course examines the food market, comparing the global and European ones. A special focus will be given to the impact that the globalization process has had on European Agricultural Policy (EAP) and on European Environmental Policy in relation to the food market. The impact of European agricultural and environmental policies on global market regulation and on relations with developing and undeveloped countries will also be analysed in depth. The course also analyses the role of the World Trade Organization (WTO) in the management of the global food market; how this management influences the EU; and the characteristics of the relationship and the strong conflicts between the WTO and the European Union.

For each topic, the instructor will provide theoretical and empirical examples related to the Italian and Tuscan reality.

The goal of the course is to enable students to analyse the role of European Union and WTO in the development of the Global Food Market.

Written final exam

The in-class written exam is designed to assess a student's knowledge of and familiarity with all the content and skills associated with the course. Professor will provide 7 open questions and the student must choose 5 to answer. Students will have two hours to complete the exam.

Oral presentation

Students choose an official EU or WTO document (EU White and Green paper; EU legislation; WTO resolution; WTO agreements) and give a 15-minute presentation with an accompnaying PowerPoint in class at the end of the term. Each student will be able to freely choose the topic and the teacher will provide 6 different documents on the subject chosen, among which students will choose one.

Writing assignments

The professor will provide several case studies regarding recent economics decisions, resolutions or policies adopted by the EU or the WTO to solve a recent problem (e.g. specific food market agreement). Students will write a short paper (4-5 pages) on a topic among those provided.



Weekly Moodle forum

Every week the professor will open a new forum on Moodle about a topic covered in the last week. The forum will ask students what they think about a specific argument. Students will have to answer the question and defend their ideas.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Successful progress of the program depends on the full cooperation of both students and faculty members: regular attendance and active participation in class are essential parts of the learning process. More than TWO unexcused absences (that are not medically excused with a written certificate of the doctor or caused by a family and/or personal emergency) will result in a lowering of your grade by a half grade.
