

HS 353 - HISTORY AND LEGENDS OF PARIS
IES Abroad Paris French Studies Center

DESCRIPTION: This course is an introduction to the history of Paris, the administrative and cultural center of France. It is a general overview of the history of France and its capital Paris. The historical period studied goes back to the origins of the creation of Paris from the Gallo-Roman period until the present, following a chronological timeline. For pedagogical reasons the seventeenth, eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth centuries are at the heart of this teaching. The history of France, the study of morals and society, the artistic and cultural history, including architecture and urban planning etc., occupy a major place in our discussion. Paris, its social life and its architecture have attracted the attention of painters, writers, photographers and filmmakers. This is the representation or the iconography of Paris that we also discuss. In summary: This course is an introduction to the history of Paris. It is a general overview and an induction course.

CONTENT HOURS: 45 hours

LANGUAGE OF INSTRUCTION: THIS COURSE IS IN FRENCH AND STUDENTS MUST EXPRESS THEMSELVES IN FRENCH

PREREQUISITES: none

SUPPLEMENTARY COSTS: Additional costs will be invoiced to the student's IES ABROAD account. These charges will cover printing costs and other expenses. Prices will vary depending on the course.

PRESENTATION METHOD: Courses will generally go as follows: first, the professor will give a clear and precise lecture about a subject detailed in the syllabus. Students will be able to follow the coursework by referring to the PowerPoint provided on Moodle. Afterwards, students will be asked to discuss the subject in question in the form of a class discussion. The third part of coursework will be devoted to readings and student presentations. Due to this format, students must be actively engaged in the subject of history and have a competent level of French. Students will also be able to refer to numerous works of art (art and architecture), as this course will include visits to museums, monuments, and historic neighborhoods. These visits will also include group discussion (sometimes with a related article upon which to comment), which will be done on the Moodle forum and in class. Students must bring the course booklet to each course. The syllabus is also an indispensable tool for the semester and is mandatory for each session.

REQUIRED WORK AND FORM OF ASSESSMENT:

- Class participation and visits: 20%
- 2 written exams: 40%
- 1 video about Paris: 20%
- 1 oral presentation: 20%

Class participation and visits (20%): Once a week (on Thursdays) students must prepare questions concerning one or more texts in the booklet found on Moodle. In addition, class visits will be followed by a discussion; students must also refer to the Moodle forum to cultivate in-class discussion. Speaking and participation is essential throughout the semester.

- 2 written exams (40%): Mid-term exam (1h30) & final exam (2h) [see the dates in the syllabus], based on questions related to course content (PowerPoint information, which can be found on the Moodle page). Dictionaries are authorized.

- 1 video about Paris (20%): This video (a minimum of 4 minutes, captured with a cell-phone, Smartphone, or tablet) will be a group work (2/3 students per group) based on a generic theme about Paris. Students must produce a film (images, music, and text, including a legend or dialogue) about a history that takes place in Paris. The video must be in a traditional video format (YouTube, for example) and it must also be produced and edited via a computer program (iMovie, for example). The entire

video should not surpass 5 minutes. More information will be provided in class, and everyone will watch these videos together. Any video that is submitted after the deadline will incur a drop in grade proportional to the number of days late.

- 1 oral presentation (20 %): Students will choose a novel from a list provided for the oral presentation (p. 8-9), and will give a 10-15 minute presentation (students must discuss the author, the book, the main characters, the plot, and their opinion on the book). This presentation will take place at the end of the course. We will decide upon the date together. There will be no extensions or ability to change the choice of book once the details are put in place. If students do not complete the presentation by the deadline, the grade will drop in proportion to the number of days late. VERY IMPORTANT: plagiarism is not acceptable at IES Abroad. If a student plagiarizes, the student will receive an "F." If you copy information, you MUST cite your source.

COURSE OUTCOMES: The goal of this course is to provide a novel view of the history of Paris by proposing a straightforward teaching style. The goal is for students to acquire a wealth of historical and artistic knowledge about the city, but also to help students develop a critical eye. Discussions, debates, and reflections on past and current events are strongly encouraged. This course will help students deepen their knowledge of history and will also help them better understand the French language and culture. Students will be able to access a wealth of images (PowerPoint), which can be found on the Moodle page.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Attendance is mandatory for all sessions, including visits. Absences and lateness will affect your ability to master class content. In addition, your final grade will be lowered for each absence.

Example:

- Final grade: A-
- 1 absence = A-, 2 absences = B+, 3 absences = B, 4 absences = B-

Being more than 15 minutes late to a course counts as an absence. 3 late arrivals (less than 15 minutes) count as an absence.

If a student misses more than 25% of class time, s/he will receive an F in the course.

Assignments and presentations missed because of absences will be given the grade of F.

When absences occur, students must inform their teacher and the French Studies Academic Coordinator as soon as possible (mfedon@iesabroad.org). In some instances (sickness with doctor's note for example), absences may be excused. If a student believes that an absence should be excused, they must contact Meghan, Scott or Seth.
