

LT 333 THE GRAND TOUR OF TUSCANY IN LITERATURE

IES Abroad Siena

DESCRIPTION:

The aim of this course is to analyze the *Grand Tour* as it took shape in Italy from the XIX century to the contemporary period, especially referring to the representation of Siena and Tuscany in Anglo-American literature. Students are introduced to the object of research and its socio-historical and cultural contexts, in addition to the literary one. Students are also provided with literary methodology and conceptual tools (concepts of culture/identity, creation/narration, representation/inner projection, and stereotyping process). The course covers selections from books by writers such as E. M. Forster, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, Francesca Alexander, Henry James, George Eliot, D. H. Lawrence, Iris Origo, Mary McCarthy, Anne Fortier, Kate Simon, and Hisham Matar. The structure and the format of the course have the students methodologically draw the maximum advantage from the local context.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- develop skills to critically evaluate literary works per se and in their contextual connotations;
- identify the main themes of important Grand Tour literary works;
- identify and analyze the sequence of the different Anglo-American literary representations of Italy referring in particular to Siena
 and Tuscany and with special attention to peoples' imagery, cultural identity, and stereotypes concerning both literature and
 culture;
- identify, through comparative textual analyses, traits and features in various authors in order to stress similarities and differences;
- analyze the historical and sociopolitical contexts of the authors and imagery in question;
- recognize the evolution, if there is one, in the literary representation of Italy connected with the *Grand Tour*, especially referring to Siena and Tuscany.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Successful progress of the program depends on the full cooperation of both students and faculty members: regular attendance and active participation in class are essential parts of the learning process. Attendance at and participation in all class meetings are required. IES Abroad Siena allows a maximum of TWO excused absences per semester. Each additional absence will automatically result in a penalty of 2 percentage points off the final grade for each unjustified absence and 4 percentage points for a scheduled academic day trip. SEVEN absences per course (including 2 excused absences) will result in a failing grade for that course. Furthermore, an absence on the date of scheduled tests, presentations or quizzes does not entitle you to recover/reschedule such tests. Failure to attend your midterm and/or final exam will result in an F grade on that paper/exam.
